**MAGUEY** 

Look beyond the rainbow colors of Mayan clothing to the natural color of ropes, nets and maguey bags and you will see the oldest woven fabrics of the Mayan world. Archaelogical evidence of clothing fragments and oblong pounding stones confirms that maguey fibers were used as early as 6500 to 4800 B.C. in Mesoamerica, long before cotton was known. Native to the Western hemisphere, maguey or agave grows in most climates and at most elevations, and is unique in that its fibers were woven by all the indigenous people of Mesoamerica.

Near San Juan Chamelco, Alta Verapaz, the legend goes that the first fibers were noticed when a bolt of lightening struck a maguey plant, searing away the outer pulpy flesh and exposing the white interior. This led to the invention of extraction and spinning methods to make a strand

suitable for the creation of rough textiles and ropes.

Today bags, ropes, cargo nets, tump lines and hammocks are still made from maguey and there are many different techniques for fiber extraction, spinning and weaving. Bags are woven on horizontal and vertical looms in Guatemala, a technique unique to the country.

However, fewer and fewer people are working with maguey because synthetic materials are common and the younger generation prefers to use knapsacks. In some villages the youngest maguey weavers are in their 70s!

Kathy Rousso curated the maguey exhibit which opened in March at the museum. She has an M.A. in textile arts from UC Davis and was in Guatemala researching maguey on a Fulbright grant. After the exhibit opened, Kathy held a slide lecture and a workshop for textile enthusiasts.

THE MAGUEY EXHIBIT opened as a celebration of Kathy Rousso's research on this ancient weaving process. Rousso also gave a talk and workshop on the special techniques used in extracting, spinning and weaving maguey fibers.

THREE COMPUTERS were donated to the museum: two by Pro-Teje, one by Canella, S.A.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY was celebrated by Pro-Teje weavers at the museum with a luncheon. Anthropologist Luz Marina Delgado gave a workshop "Manos de Mujer" emphasizing their value as women, and discussing women's health, nutrition, education, famililies and rights.
